Cover That Saucepan

This budget column can save you the price of the paper.

Reduce energy consumption in cooking. Use pans that cover the heating element so that more heat enters the pot and less is lost to the surrounding air.

When cooking in aluminum foil, dull side out is the rule to follow. This way, the heat is reflected off the shiny surface of the foil and helps to cook the food.

A microwave oven is a very efficient device for cooking foods. For example, half-inch thick hamburgers can be cooked in only three minutes, using 66 watt-hours of energy and costing only about one-fourth of a cent.

If you're using more than one rack in your oven, don't place a dish directly over the one on the rack below. Slaggering the cooking utensils will allow better heat circulation and minimize cooking time.

Clean the heat reflector below the heating element on your stove — it will reflect the heat better and shorten cooking time.

Oven cooking is more economical than surface cooking. Ovens require energy only periodically since the insulation holds in the heat. Cook tops consume energy the entire time they're in operation.

If the flame on your gas range is not blue, it's not operating properly. If the color of the flame has traces of yellow, the burners may have become clogged with food particles and should be cleaned. When clog, lift out and clean burner with a wire pipe cleaner — NOT a toothpick.

PROVO, Utah (UPI) — The next generation of Americans may live on frozen heat-and-eat dinners and instant breakfasts, says Marton Benning, professor of Food Sciences and Nutrition at Brigham Young University.

She said convenience foods are here to stay, and that food scientists and nutritionists are concerned about their nutritional content.

Such foods can be important in America's diet if their essential nutrient content is equal to or greater than the nutrients in the foods they replace, the professor said.

Highly fortified formulated and fabricated foods can contribute to nutritional imbalance if their vitamin fortification is out of proportion to their other nutrients and calorie content, the professor said.

Take Care

The fast-growing popularity of house plants brings a warning from Don Steingger, Extension hor-

ticulture specialist at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Steingger said plant owners and particularly parents of small children should know which plants are potentially dangerous when eaten. Some such illnesses can be severe enough to require hospitalization he said.

His list of dangerous plants include the seeds of castor beans, dieffenbachia, calladium and some philodendrons; hyacinth, narcissus and daffodil bulbs, rosary pea seeds and leaves and branches of oleander.

HOUSTON (UPI) — Thunder is the crash and rumble associated with lightning and is caused by explosive expansion of air heated by the stroke, according to the national weather service.

When lightning is close by, the thunder is a sharp explosive sound. More distant strokes produce the familiar growl and rumble of thunder, a result of sound being refracted and modified by the turbulent environment of a thunderstorm.
